Meryl "Sunny" Wilde

Meryl Louise Collins was born in Pueblo, Colorado to Duane and Alice Collins and grew up in San Jose California. When she was young she was given the name "Sunny" because of her personality and looks. A name she lived up to all of her life. She woke up the morning after her 16th birthday to hear the radio broadcasting that Pearl Harbor had been bombed.

Shortly after WWII, Sunny married Lewis Wilde – a great partnership until Lew died of lung cancer. They had one daughter, Dian, who is a member of Deming Rebekah Lodge #16. When Dian was two years old, they moved to White Sands Proving Ground (now Missile Range) so "they wouldn't have In-laws telling them how to raise their daughter." They actually lived on the base in very small trailer house as civilians. She said moving to the desert from Northern California

was quite a shock, especially having to take special training for rattlesnakes in order to live on base. Sunny soon also had a job at the Proving Ground.

Sunny, Lew, and Dian moved to Houston, TX, where he was offered a job as a machinist with the fledgling space agency, NASA. Sunny was also offered a job as property officer. While there they participated in the exciting life of space missions. After several years in Houston, they were given the opportunity to transfer back to White Sands with the NASA team. This time they lived in Las Cruces like most civilians. Participating in the shuttle landing at White Sands was one of the most exciting events Sunny was involved in there.

Sunny was recruited and initiated into Miriam Rebekah Lodge #25 when they need members for their drill team to go to Sovereign Grand Lodge held in Oceanside, California. She was a backbone of that lodge for as long as she was able. After a brief hiatus while she was in Houston, she returned to lodge when she returned to Las Cruces.

Throughout their married life (and probably before), Sunny and Lew were avid drag racers. Sunny always loved cars. In addition to many other lodge and assembly offices, she was the "Official Chauffer." This was the reason she chose the Race Car as her emblem when she was Rebekah Assembly President in 1996-1997 with a Motto "Race into the future with Odd Fellowship", with the Starter Flag as her traveling emblem,. Her theme was "Increase your pit crew with new members." Her Grand Master was Fred Schneider. She passed away August 5 and memorial services are planned for October.

Peggy Paler

When Peggy joined Arkisgo Theta Rho Girls' Club at the age of 12, she became the third generation of her family to become a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. She was an active member, participating in community service, a drill team and learning about the principles of Odd Fellowship. When she was a junior in high school, she wrote an essay and won a trip on the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth sponsored by the Odd Fellows and went on a three week tour of the United States and Canada. In New York City, the group went to the United Nations, toured



the building and was able to sit in on discussions of the future of the Trust Territories, never realizing that one day she would be living there. The trip so impressed her that it influenced her entire life. She joined Triple Link Rebekah Lodge #10 at the age of 21 and was active until she moved to Guam when she took a withdrawal card. In 1980 she reinstated her membership. After the death of her husband and moving back to Albuquergue, she became an Advisor to Arkisgo Theta Rho Girls' Club #1. She spent many years devoting her time and efforts as a mentor to teenage girls; teaching them the same values that she received when she was a young lady belonging to the club. She served as Noble Grand for two years 1994 & 1995 and became active at the Rebekah Assembly by serving as a Trustee on the Bettye Miller Memorial Scholarship Board. She served as Page at the International Association of Rebekah Assemblies in Kansas City when her sister, Barbara, was International President.

Over the years, Peggy had acquired an extensive collection of dolls and among the collection was an assortment of the Madame Alexander 8" Dolls of the World, concentrating on the dolls from the countries in which there are Rebekahs. In 2011, she donated this collection of 26 dolls to the Schulyer Colfax Museum of the International Association of Rebekah Assemblies in Winston-Salem, NC where it is on permanent display.

She is survived by her sisters Sandi McWatters and Barbara Corfield of Albuquerque, Niece Sherri Villegas, Nephews Doug McWatters, Ken Corfield. Bob Corfield, and their families; a host of worldwide friends and many fraternal brothers and sisters. She passed away August 4 and memorial services were held in Albuquerque on August 10.
